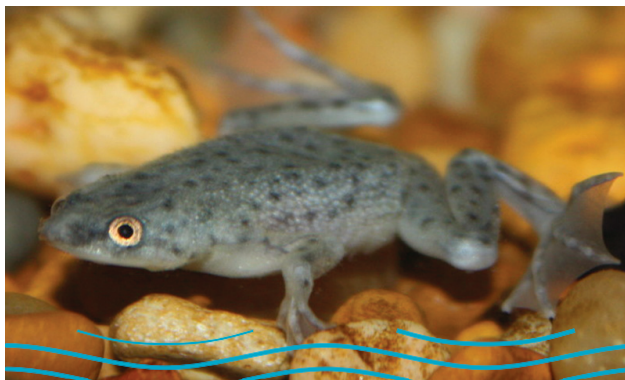

Freshwater Amphibians

includes dwarf african frogs, albino clawed frog and firebelly newt species, and tadpoles

These fully aquatic Amphibians never need to leave the water. African Dwarf Frogs can be kept with community fish. Tadpoles will eventually transform into a terrestrial frog, depending on species; check the terrestrial frog care sheet for proper frog care.

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where the healthy pets go

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diet

A well-balanced Freshwater Amphibian diet consists of:

- Bloodworms and brine shrimp (live or frozen).
- Sinking fish food pellets.
- Tadpoles require algae wafers and sinking pellets.

feeding

Things to remember when feeding your Freshwater Amphibian:

- Feed once a day.
- Thaw frozen food before feeding.

housing

- Keep in an appropriate size aquarium; provide plenty of hiding places and a secure lid to prevent jumping.
- **Stable water quality, water temperature, and pH levels are critical to the health of the aquatic life. If you are unsure of your water quality or pH levels, Petco provides free water testing.**

characteristics

Spends most of the day on the bottom of the tank, but swims to the surface to breathe air.

habitat maintenance

Daily: check filter, water temperature and other equipment.

Weekly: check water quality at least once a week.

Monthly: change 10-25% of the total volume of water every 2-4 weeks, or as needed.

Introduce new inhabitants to the aquarium gradually.

compatibility

Check Petco's freshwater compatibility care sheet for species specific information.

signs of a healthy amphibian

- Swims actively
- Hides often
- Eats vigorously
- Clear eyes and smooth skin
- Remains in the bottom half of the aquarium

Avoid overcrowded conditions; they are a major cause of stress and disease. Maintain good water quality with regular water changes and adequate filtration.

red flags

- loss of appetite
- hazy or cloudy eyes
- does not swim away from capture
- floating on the top of the aquarium

If you notice any of these signs, test water quality and improve as necessary.

common health issues

Health Issue	Symptoms or Causes	Suggested Action
Bacterial infection	Cloudy eyes, open sores, and/or reddening of the skin.	Improve water quality and consult your aquatic veterinarian for treatment; seek veterinary advice.
Fungal infection	Red inflammation of the skin, or any other abnormal change in skin color.	Quarantine frog immediately; seek veterinary advice.
