#### Frequently Asked Questions

# Q. How long will it take to toilet train my cat using the Litter Kwitter®?

This will depend on the age & temperament of your cat. Young cats can be trained in 2 weeks, older cats may take 12 weeks. On average we say the training should take 8 weeks

# Q. Will the Litter Kwitter <sup>®</sup> arrive with instructions?

The Litter Kwitter<sup>®</sup> ships with full printed instructions plus a DVD to lead you through each stage of the training system. The DVD will play on a PC, MAC or DVD player.

### Q. Is the training easy to do? Can anyone do it?

The training is organised into 3 colour-coded stages to make it simple for the cat owner to follow. The product is supplied with a 30 minute DVD to actually show cat owners what to do, how to do it & what to expect at each stage.

#### Q. Can any cat learn to use the toilet?

Any cat that can use a litter tray should be able to learn to use the toilet.

#### Q. Can you train kittens to use the toilet?

Yes. In fact kittens are probably the easiest to train. However, we don't recommend training kittens below the age of 3 months or particularly small kittens as they may not be strong or coordinated enough to balance well on the toilet rim.

#### Q. Can older cats learn to use the toilet?

The simple answer is yes! Customers have told us of their 10, 12 and 15 year old cats successfully learning to use the loo. Young cats have fewer bad habits to unlearn whereas older cats have more entrenched behaviours. However, each cat is different & if you have an older cat you will know its personality well. If it's generally bright, easy-going and receptive to

change then there should be no problem. As a rule of thumb we'd say that up to the age of five or six there should be no problem. For older cats just be prepared to be a little more patient & make changes more slowly.

### Q. How does the Litter Kwitter ® work?

The Litter Kwitter<sup>®</sup> uses the cat's existing ability to use a litter tray & modifies it in small behavioural steps until it happily uses the toilet. Cats have a need to hide the smell of their waste which is why they try to bury it in litter or elsewhere. The underlying principle of the Litter Kwitter<sup>®</sup> training is to gradually expose the cat to the toilet & allow it to experience the toilet's ability to take away the smell of its waste.
